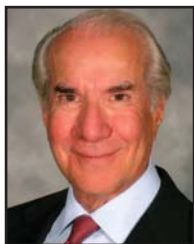

Ed Snider took a risk in 1966 that would come to characterize his career for the next five decades. He pledged his home as collateral for a loan to create the Philadelphia Flyers, and then used that foundation to build one of the preeminent sports and entertainment organizations in the world – Comcast-Spectacor. His role as Philadelphia's leading architect of the current sports scene was recognized by Philadelphia's fans in 1999, when readers of the Philadelphia Daily News voted Snider as the city's greatest mover and shaker of the millennium.

When the National Hockey League decided to expand in 1966, Philadelphia was not on the radar of cities expected to receive an expansion team. Snider waged a one-man campaign to convince the League and succeeded. He had to promise the new team would have a home and convinced City officials that, if they would provide him five acres of land on what was supposed to be part of the parking lot

for the new Veterans Stadium, he would build an arena. Snider oversaw the construction of the Spectrum and eventually took control of it.

In 1974, Snider created Spectacor to oversee the Flyers and the Spectrum. This new company quickly became a major player in the national sports and entertainment scene. Nearly a dozen successful enterprises flourished under the Spectacor banner.

In 1996, Snider merged Spectacor with Comcast Corporation to form Comcast-Spectacor. That same year, he saw another dream come to fruition with the opening of the Wachovia Center, a \$210 million state-of-the-art sports/entertainment complex. Today, the Wachovia Center is one of the most active sports and entertainment venues in the world.

Comcast-Spectacor quickly changed the sports world's national landscape by creating Comcast SportsNet, the first regional sports network to operate on a 24-hour basis with its own original programming. Today, there are Comcast SportsNet stations operating in major markets throughout the country, including Chicago, IL, Portland, OR, and New York, NY.

Comcast-Spectacor now encompasses Global Spectrum, a facilities management company with clients throughout the world; Ovations Food Services, a national food concession company; New Era Tickets, an innovative provider of technological solutions for box office management, event management, and customer communications; and the Flyers Skate Zone, a network of regional ice skating rinks.

While Comcast-Spectacor's success stands as testimony to Snider's vision and entrepreneurial skills, the creation of the Ed Snider Youth Hockey Foundation is Snider's true legacy. The Foundation was started by Snider in 2005, to provide a means to reach inner-city children by giving them the chance to learn to play hockey. Hockey, however, is only the "hook" – the program teaches the children necessary life skills and provides them with educational assistance to help them stay in school. The program has already touched the lives of over 2,000 children, and reflects Snider's strong commitment to give back to the community that has supported him.

Snider's achievements and his philanthropy have earned numerous awards and recognition. He was elected to the Hockey Hall of Fame in 1988 and serves on the NHL's Executive Committee. He is a recipient of the Lester Patrick Award for outstanding service to hockey in the United States and has been elected to the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame, the Philadelphia Sports Hall of Fame, the Philadelphia Jewish Sports Hall of Fame, the Greater Washington DC Jewish Sports Hall of Fame, and the Flyers Hall of Fame. In 2005, Snider received the Greater Philadelphia Chamber of Commerce's William Penn Award, the most prestigious business honor in the region, and the Ellis Island Medal of Honor awarded to Americans of all ethnic backgrounds who have made significant contributions to our society.

In February of 2001, Snider received Temple University's First Annual Sports Leadership Award. In December 1999, he received the Anti-Defamation League's prestigious Americanism Award. In 1985, Snider received an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree from MCP Hahnemann University and in May of 1999, he received the same from Thomas Jefferson Hospital. He is also a Benefactor of the Sol C. Snider Entrepreneurial Center of the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania. Other Board memberships include the National Foundation for Celiac Awareness, The Atlas Society, the Simon Wiesenthal Center and the Middle East Forum.

Snider resides in suburban Philadelphia. His children include daughters Lindy, Tina, and Sarena and sons Craig, Jay, and Samuel. With all his accomplishments, one of his greatest joys is spending time with his 15 grandchildren.

# PETER A. LUUKKO

[PRESIDENT/CHIEF OPERATING OFFICER OF COMCAST-SPECTACOR, CHAIRMAN OF GLOBAL SPECTRUM]



Peter A. Luukko is President and Chief Operating Officer of Comcast-Spectacor. He works closely with Comcast-Spectacor Chairman Ed Snider in overseeing the day-to-day operations of all of the company's interests.

Additionally, Luukko, who is also Chairman of Global Spectrum, is responsible for creating new business opportunities for Comcast-Spectacor in the fields of facility management, sports ownership and operation, food and concessions, as well as consulting in those same fields.

Luukko's extensive sports management career began in 1981 after parlaying an internship at the New Haven Coliseum into the Director of Marketing for the facility. He later joined the Providence Civic Center as the facility's assistant general manager. In 1985 Luukko joined Spectacor Management Group (SMG), at the time owned in part by Snider, and soon became Vice President of SMG's

Western Region and facility manager for SMG's Los Angeles Coliseum and Sports Arena. During that time, he was credited for greatly improving the facilities' reputation. In addition, he had spent time overseeing other SMG facilities.

In 1993, Luukko left SMG to become President of the Spectrum. In the following years he became responsible for managing Comcast-Spectacor's growing interests, and helped the company into a nationally recognized leader in sports and entertainment with the acquisition of Globe Facility Services in 2000. After renaming the company Global Spectrum, the public assembly management firm grew from seven facilities in 2000 to just over 80 facilities in 2009. Additionally in 2000, Comcast-Spectacor acquired Leisure Food Services and renamed the company Ovations Food Services. Comcast-Spectacor made a significant investment into a ticketing technology company, Paciolan, and employed its technology to create a full-service ticketing company, New Era Tickets, in 2004.

Under Luukko's leadership, Comcast-Spectacor helped Philadelphia garner national attention and awareness by attracting the 2002 NBA All-Star Weekend, the 2001 NCAA Men's East Regionals, the 2001 and 2002 X Games, the 2000 NCAA Women's Final Four, the 2000 Republican National Convention, the 2008 U.S. Olympic Team Trials for Gymnastics, the 2011 NCAA Wrestling Championships, and numerous other sports and entertainment events to the City of Philadelphia.

A recognized leader in the facility management industry, Luukko was the 2000 recipient of the City of Hope's Tri-State Labor Award. He also received the 2002 prestigious Harold J. VanderZwaag Distinguished Alumnus Award from the Sports Management Program of the University of Massachusetts for his accomplishments in the field of sports management.

Luukko actively serves on the Board of Directors for the Philadelphia Convention and Visitors Bureau, the Philadelphia Sports Congress, Paciolan Technologies, and the Battleship New Jersey Museum. He also serves on the National Hockey League's Board of Governors.

Luukko is a hockey player, hockey coach, and hockey parent. He is a graduate of the University of Massachusetts. He and his wife, Casey, along with their children; Nick, Dana, and Max; reside in West Chester, Pennsylvania.



Paul Holmgren enters his fourth season as club GM and his 31st season as a member of the Flyers organization.

Last season, Holmgren put together a Flyers club that finished with a 44-27-11 record for 99 points and finished in third place in the Atlantic Division and fifth in the Eastern Conference. The Flyers surpassed their totals in wins (44) and points (99) from the previous season as well as set a franchise record by finishing the regular season having allowed just one shorthanded goal. The previous record in a single season was two, set in 1967-68 and 1978-79.

In 2007-08, his first full season as general manager, Holmgren guided the Flyers to the NHL's best turnaround, improving 39 points in the standings (95 points in 2007-08 after 56 points in 2006-07), and to a spot in the Stanley Cup Playoffs, advancing to the Eastern Conference Finals. Since the NHL expanded the playoffs to four rounds, starting with the 1980 Playoffs, the 2007-08 Flyers were only the second team to finish with the worst record in the NHL one season and reach the third round of the playoffs the next season (Detroit Red Wings in 1987). The 2007-08 Flyers were also the first team in 13 years to advance to the second round of the playoffs after finishing the previous season with the worst record in the league (San Jose Sharks in 1994).

He was named general manager on November 11, 2006, after serving as interim general manager since replacing Bob Clarke who resigned on October 22, 2006. Prior to his promotion, Holmgren had served the previous seven seasons as the team's assistant general manager. He was named assistant general manager on June 14, 1999.

He was named assistant general manager of the U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team that competed in the 2006 Olympic Winter Games in Torino, Italy and general manager for the 2006 U.S. National Team for the IIHF World Championships. He served as an assistant coach for Team USA at the 1998 Winter Olympic Games. He was named Flyers' director of player personnel on August 6, 1997, after serving as director of pro scouting over parts of two seasons. He replaced Bill Barber as the Flyers' director of pro scouting when Barber was named head coach of the Hershey Bears on December 30, 1995. He was named as an assistant coach for Team USA for the World Cup of Hockey Tournament on June 27, 1996. He rejoined the Flyers organization as a scout after being replaced as the Hartford Whalers' head coach on November 6, 1995. Holmgren compiled a 59-93-14 record as head coach of the Whalers through parts of four seasons (1992-93 to 1995-96). He was re-appointed as head coach of the Whalers by team President and General Manager Jim Rutherford on June 28, 1994.

He stepped down as the Whalers' head coach 17 games into the 1993-94 season to concentrate on his duties as general manager. He was named general manager and head coach of the Whalers prior to the start of the 1993-94 season. He was named head coach of the Whalers on June 15, 1992. He served as Flyers head coach for four seasons (1988-89 to 1991-92), compiling a 107-126-31 record. He was named head coach of the Flyers on June 1, 1988, after serving three seasons as an assistant coach with the club. He was the first former Flyer to be named head coach of the team.

He retired from playing after the 1984-85 season, having recorded 144 goals and 179 assists for 323 points and 1,684 penalty minutes in 527 career regular season NHL games with the Flyers and the Minnesota North Stars. He was traded to the North Stars by the Flyers in exchange for Paul Guay and a third round pick in the 1985 NHL Entry Draft (Darryl Gilmour) on February 23, 1984. He recorded 138 goals and 171 assists for 309 points and 1,600 penalty minutes in 500 games over parts of nine seasons with the Flyers (1975-76 to 1983-84). His 1,600 penalty minutes with the Flyers are second all-time in club history. He was drafted from the University of Minnesota by the Flyers in the sixth round (108th overall) of the 1975 NHL Entry Draft. Paul and his wife, Doreen, reside in Somerdale, New Jersey. He has four children: Jason, Kirsten, Wes, and Greta.

# JOHN STEVENS [HEAD COACH]



Stevens enters his fourth season as the club's head coach after leading the Flyers to a 44-27-11 for 99 points and third place finish in the Atlantic Division and fifth-place finish in the Eastern Conference. The Flyers surpassed their totals in wins (44) and points (99) from the previous season as well as set a franchise record by finishing the regular season having allowed just one shorthanded goal. The previous record in a single season was two, set in 1967-68 and 1978-79.

In 2007-08, Stevens led the Flyers to the Eastern Conference Finals after posting a 42-29-11 record and 95 points to finish fourth in the Atlantic Division and sixth in the Eastern Conference in 2007-08, his first full season as the club's head coach. The Flyers finished 39 points and 20 wins ahead of their totals from the 2006-07 season (22-48-12 for 56 points). Their 39-point turnaround was the most of any team in the National Hockey League for the 2007-08 season. In

recognition of his work during the 2007-08 season, he was named Coach of the Year by The Hockey News.

He was promoted from assistant coach on October 22, 2006 and is the 16th head coach in Flyers history, while also the fourth former Flyer to be named the team's head coach, joining Paul Holmgren, Terry Murray and Bill Barber. He was named an assistant coach on June 5, 2006. Prior to joining the Flyers' coaching staff, Stevens was the head coach of the Flyers' American Hockey League affiliate, the Philadelphia Phantoms, for the previous six seasons (2000-01 through 2005-06) and led the team to the Calder Cup Championship in 2005. Stevens' career AHL coaching record is 230-181-33-25 in 480 regular season games, not including 11 shootout losses. He has a 29-19 record in 48 career Calder Cup Playoff games.

He was named the second-ever head coach of the Phantoms on June 8, 2000. His 480 games coached and 230 career wins are the most in Phantoms history. He was named an assistant coach for the Phantoms on February 10, 1999, after announcing his retirement from hockey due to an eye injury. Stevens was inducted into the Philadelphia Phantoms Hall of Fame on February 18, 2007.

A native of Campbellton, New Brunswick, Stevens played 15 seasons of professional hockey as a defenseman (1984-85 to 1998-99), including 53 NHL games with the Flyers and Hartford Whalers. Over parts of five seasons (1986-87 and 1987-88 with the Flyers and 1990-91, 1991-92 and 1993-94 with Hartford), Stevens recorded 10 assists and 48 penalty minutes in 53 games. In 834 career AHL games over 14 seasons with the Hershey Bears (1984-85 and 1986-87 through 1989-90), Springfield Indians/Falcons (1990-91 through 1995-96) and the Phantoms (1996-97 to 1998-99), Stevens registered 21 goals and 167 assists for 188 points and 1,399 penalty minutes. He was a member of three Calder Cup Championship teams as a player (Hershey - 1988, Springfield - 1991 and Philadelphia - 1998) and won the Barry Ashbee Award as the Phantoms' top defenseman for the 1996-97 season. He was named the Phantoms' first-ever captain on October 1, 1996. Stevens was originally drafted from the Oshawa Generals of the Ontario Hockey League by the Flyers in the third round (47th overall) of the 1984 NHL Entry Draft. Stevens and his wife, Stacy, have two sons, John and Nolan. Stevens was born on May 4, 1966.

# PHILADELPHIA FLYERS COACHING STAFF



## CRAIG BERUBE | ASSISTANT COACH

Craig Berube enters his second full season with the Flyers as an assistant coach. He rejoined the Flyers' coaching staff on August 7, 2008, after serving as the Philadelphia Phantoms' head coach for the 2007-08 season. The Phantoms posted a 46-27-4-3 record to finish second in the AHL's East Division and advanced to the East Division Finals in 2007-08. Over parts of two seasons (2006-07 and 2007-08), Berube compiled a 49-29-5-3 record as head coach of the Phantoms. Berube was renamed the Phantoms' head coach on June 4, 2007 after serving as assistant coach for the Flyers for part of the 2006-07 season. Previously, he had served as the Phantoms' head coach for the first six games of the 2006-07 season, posting a 3-2-1 record before being named an assistant coach for the Flyers on October 23, 2006. He was originally named head coach of the Phantoms on June 14, 2006.

Prior to being named head coach of the Phantoms, Berube served as an assistant coach for the Phantoms for parts of three seasons (2003-04 through 2005-06). He joined the Phantoms organization after signing as a free agent on November 18, 2003, and was named a player/assistant coach on January 29, 2004. He recorded six assists and 134 penalty minutes in 33 regular season games for the Phantoms during the 2003-04 season, his 18th and final professional season.

Over parts of 17 NHL seasons (1986-87 through 2002-03), Berube registered 61 goals and 98 assists for 159 points and 3,149 penalty minutes in 1,054 career regular season games for the Flyers, Toronto Maple Leafs, Calgary Flames, Washington Capitals and New York Islanders. His 3,149 career penalty minutes ranks seventh on the NHL's All-Time List.

Over parts of seven seasons with the Flyers (1986-87 through 1990-91, 1998-99 and 1999-2000), Berube recorded 20 goals and 34 assists for 54 points and 1,138 penalty minutes in 323 regular season games. His 1,138 penalty minutes ranks ninth on the Flyers' All-Time List. He was originally signed as a free agent by the Flyers on March 19, 1986.

Berube and his wife, Rebecca, have three children: sons, Jake and Nashota, and daughter, Charlotte. Berube was born on December 17, 1965.



## JACK MCLHARGEY | ASSISTANT COACH

Jack McIlhargey is in his third season with the team as an assistant coach. He was named an assistant coach on June 6, 2007. Prior to joining the Flyers, McIlhargey served as a professional scout for the Vancouver Canucks and had served the Canucks in a variety of roles over the last 20 years. He was an assistant coach for the Canucks for seven seasons (1999-2000 through 2005-06) and was head coach of the Canucks' top minor league affiliate for eight seasons in Milwaukee, Hamilton and Syracuse (1991-92 through 1998-99). He was also an assistant coach for the Canucks for seven seasons from 1984-85 through 1990-91.

A native of Edmonton, Alberta, McIlhargey played eight seasons in the NHL with the Flyers (1974-75 to 1976-77, 1979-80 and 1980-81), Vancouver (1976-77 to 1979-80) and Hartford Whalers (1980-81 and 1981-82), recording 11 goals and 36 assists for 47 points and 1,102 penalty minutes in 393 regular season games. In 128 regular season games with the Flyers, McIlhargey registered three goals and seven assists for 10 points and 497 penalty minutes.

McIlhargey and his wife, Karyne, have three daughters, Erin, Georgia and Anna. McIlhargey was born on March 7, 1952.

# PHILADELPHIA FLYERS COACHING STAFF



## JOE MULLEN | ASSISTANT COACH

Joe Mullen is in his third season with the team as an assistant coach. He was named an assistant coach on June 6, 2007. Mullen joined the Flyers' coaching staff after serving as an assistant coach with the Flyers' American Hockey League affiliate, the Philadelphia Phantoms, during the 2006-07 season. After starting the 2005-06 season as an assistant coach with the Pittsburgh Penguins, he took over the head coaching position of the Penguins' AHL affiliate, the Wilkes-Barre/Scranton Penguins, after the promotion of Michel Therrien. He finished the season with a 28-16-3-5 mark. Prior to joining Wilkes-Barre/Scranton, he was an assistant coach for Pittsburgh for parts of six seasons (2000-01 to 2005-06).

A native of New York, NY, Mullen played 17 seasons in the NHL with the St. Louis Blues, Calgary Flames, Pittsburgh and Boston Bruins (1979-80, 1981-82 through 1996-97), recording 502 goals and 561 assists for 1,063 points and 241 penalty minutes in 1,062 regular season games. His 502 goals are third all-time among U.S.-born players. He was a member of three Stanley Cup Championship teams, with Calgary in 1989 and Pittsburgh in 1991 and 1992. A three-time NHL All-Star, Mullen twice won the Lady Byng Trophy as "the player adjudged to have exhibited the best type of sportsmanship and gentlemanly conduct combined with a high standard of playing ability" (1987 and 1989). He was named to the NHL First All-Star Team following the 1988-89 season, after setting career highs for goals (51), assists (59) and points (110) in a season, while leading the league in plus/minus with a +51 rating.

In 1995, Mullen received the Lester Patrick Trophy "for outstanding service to hockey in the United States." He became the first American-born player to record 1,000 points when he picked up an assist on February 7, 1995, and became the first American to reach the 500-goal plateau on March 14, 1997. He was inducted into the Hockey Hall of Fame in his first year of eligibility in 2000, two years after his induction into the United States Hockey Hall of Fame (1998).

Mullen and his wife, Linda, have three sons, Ryan, Michael and Patrick, and a daughter, Erin. Mullen was born on February 26, 1957.



## JEFF REESE | GOALTENDING COACH

Reese enters his first season with the club as goaltending coach. He spent the last eight seasons with the Tampa Bay Lightning coaching staff, where he was responsible for working with all goaltenders in the Lightning organization, as well as assisting in the assessment of amateur goaltenders for the NHL Entry Draft.

Over parts of 11 seasons in the NHL with the Toronto Maple Leafs (1987-88 through 1991-92 and 1998-99), Calgary Flames (1991-92 to 1993-94), Hartford Whalers (1993-94 to 1995-96), Lightning (1995-96) and New Jersey Devils (1996-97), Reese posted a 53-65-17 record with a 3.66 goals-against average and five shutouts in 174 contests. In 11 appearances in the Stanley Cup Playoffs, he has a 3-5 mark with a 4.08 GAA.

He was born on March 24, 1966 in Brantford, Ontario and was selected by Toronto in the fourth round (67th overall) of the 1984 NHL Entry Draft.

### ADAM PATTERSON | VIDEO COACH

Adam Patterson enters his first season as video coach and seventh overall year with the Flyers organization, having served two seasons with the club's AHL affiliate, the Philadelphia Phantoms, including the 2004-05 season in which the Phantoms won the Calder Cup.

A native of Peterborough, Ontario, Patterson graduated from Eastern Michigan University with a degree in Communications and Video Production, while captaining the school's Ice Hockey Team for his final three years and was four-times named CSHL All-Star and three-time Division 1 All-American. Prior to that Patterson played junior hockey in Stratford, Ontario and in Detroit for the Compuware Ambassadors. He is the son of former Flyer and team scout Dennis Patterson.
